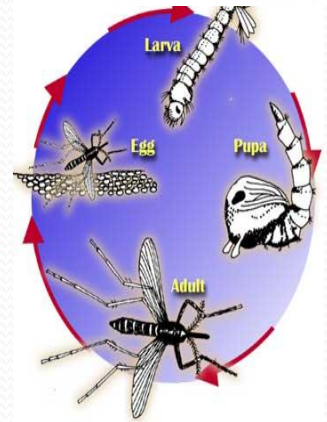

How Do Mosquitoes Choose Who to Bite?

Mosquitoes are attracted by CO (Carbon dioxide) in our breath. They can detect this from great distances. When the female mosquito gets close, she makes a final choice using skin temperature, odor and other chemical or visual factors. If two people are outside together, one will almost always get most of the mosquito bites.

Do All Mosquitoes Suck Our Blood?

Only the female mosquitoes feed on blood, male mosquitoes feed on plant nectar and juices. Some species only feed on the blood of amphibians (frogs). Mosquitoes have been observed feeding on other insects, even other mosquitoes. Male and female mosquitoes in the genus *Toxorhynchites* feed on plant nectar. The minute mosquitoes in the genus *Malaya* wait for ants then thrust their proboscis between the mandibles (jaws) of the ant. The ant then feeds the mosquito.
