Botulism

Botulism is a rare, yet serious illness that can be caused by eating foods contaminated with the bacteria Clostridium botulinum. This bacteria is commonly found in soil and produces a toxin that affects the nervous system. It is rare but if contracted requires immediate medical attention.

What causes foodborne botulism?

Foodborne botulism comes from eating foods contaminated with the toxin. The mains sources are home-canned foods with a low-acid content, improperly canned commercial foods, home-canned or fermented fish, herb-infused oils, baked potatoes in aluminum foil, cheese sauce, bottled garlic, foods held warm for extended periods of time and honey for infants.

Recycling Stats July 2017

HOW MANY TIMES CAN THAT BE RECYCLED?

Plastic: Once or twice

Most of the time, plastic is recycled into a fabric because it is no longer recyclable after one use.

Paper: 5 to 7

Paper is almost as tricky as plastic, as its ability to be recycled is lowered after every reuse. Paper is made up of long fibers, so every time it is recycled, those fibers will be shortened and make it harder to be recycled the next time. The average number of times your printer paper can be recycled is about five to seven times. From that point, it can be made into more of a paper paste and can be used for things like newspaper or egg cartons.

Metals: Infinite

Metals are categorized into ferrous and non-ferrous metals. All metals have an unlimited lifespan, and it is always a good idea to recycle them, regardless of how much you have.

Glass: Infinite

Glass, like metal, can be recycled an unlimited number of times. Because glass is harder to create from scratch, it is actually more cost-effective to reuse and recycle glass, making it the best item to buy at the store.

Tips to Prevent Mosquito Bites

Using the right insect repellent and other preventive actions can discourage mosquitoes, ticks and other biting insects from landing on you. Here are tips for other preventive actions you can take against mosquitoes.

Remove Mosquito Habitats

- •Eliminate standing water in rain gutters, old tires, buckets, plastic covers, toys, or any other container where mosquitoes can breed.
- •Empty and change the water in bird baths, fountains, wading pools, rain barrels, and potted plant trays at least once a week to destroy potential mosquito habitats.
- •Drain or fill temporary pools of water with dirt.
- •Keep swimming pool water treated and circulating.

Use Structural Barriers

- •Cover all gaps in walls, doors, and windows to prevent mosquitoes from entering.
- •Make sure window and door screens are in good working order.
- •Completely cover baby carriers and beds with netting.

Avoid Getting Bitten

- •Keep mosquitoes away from exposed skin by wearing long-sleeved shirts, long pants, and socks.
- •Tuck shirts into pants and pants into socks to cover gaps in your clothing where mosquitoes can get to your skin.
- •Stay indoors at sunrise, sunset, and early in the evening when mosquitoes are most active.
