



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

# CAMERON COUNTY EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION DISTRICT (CCECD) EMERGENCY WARNING NOTIFICATION SYSTEM (EWNS)

MASTER USE AGREEMENT

This Master Use Agreement is made this ____ day of June, 2011 in Brownsville, Texas, between (1) CAMERON COUNTY EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION DISTRICT, hereinafter "CCECD," having a principal place of business at 513 East Jackson Street, Suite 323, Harlingen, Texas 78550, (2) SOUTH TEXAS EMERGENCY CARE FOUNDATION, hereinafter "STECF," having a principal place of business at 1705 Vermont Avenue, Harlingen, Texas 78550, (3) CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS, hereinafter "CAMCO," having a principal place of business at 1100 East Monroe Street, Brownsville, Texas 78520, and (4) the eight Primary PSAPs (the ninth PSAP, a Secondary PSAP, being operated by STECF) in Cameron County set forth in Schedule A to this Agreement, which Schedule is incorporated by reference herein as if fully copied and set forth at length, hereinafter "PSAPs," as follows:

I.

#### Purpose Of Agreement

Α.

Understanding that CCECD has acquired and established, for use in Cameron County only, the said Early Warning Notification System (EWNS), also referred to, at times, as an Emergency Alert System (EAS), for certain (and only for) emergencies, utilizing the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) in Cameron County (only) and REVERSE 911® System technology, with technical assistance provided by STECF to implement and oversee the operation of the EWNS, in cooperation with CCECD, this Agreement is to memorialize those arrangements between CCECD and STECF, and further, to establish operational protocols for the said EWNS, involving arrangements between CCECD and STECF, on behalf of the EWNS, with CAMCO (which can serve, like a PSAP, as a County-wide "launcher" or "user" of the CCECD EWNS) and all (eight) of the said Primary PSAPS.

The said arrangements and operational protocols for the EWNS are set forth in this Agreement, as if this was an "operations manual" (as set forth as the terms of this Agreement).

II.

#### Operational Protocols

Α.

The Operational Protocols for the Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) are addressed in the following paragraphs, and are to be considered as rules governing the use of the EWNS (i.e., the EAS), protocols for the operation of the EWNS, and contractual provisions that are binding (as appropriate) upon all of the parties to this Agreement.

В.

Attached as Schedule B is a true and correct copy of CCECD Order #2009-1 of the CCECD Board Of Managers, establishing an EWNS in Cameron County, utilizing REVERSE 911® System technology, which authorizes the REVERSE 911® System in and for Cameron County, under the auspices of CCECD.

C.

Attached to CCECD Order #2009-1, as Exhibit A to that Order, is the Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) Protocol (Cameron County, Texas) that was adopted for use by CCECD for the EWNS, utilizing REVERSE 911[®] System technology, a true and correct copy of that (General) EWNS Protocol being attached to this Master Use Agreement as Schedule C.

D.

Attached as Schedule D is a true and correct copy of the (Specific) EWNS/EAS Protocol Manual for Cameron County, Texas, which addresses day to day operations and technical matters (e.g., "call initiation" protocols) that are required by CCECD in establishing the REVERSE 911® System in Cameron County, as the EWNS, in conjunction with CCECD's Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS), by STECF, as the REVERSE 911® System "facility" (i.e., "facilitator") for the EWNS, as well as CAMCO, as the

designated State Emergency Coordinator for Cameron County, the EWNS to be utilized by both CAMCO and the said Primary PSAPs.

Ε.

Attached as Schedule E is a true and correct copy of a Resolution of the CCECD Board Of Managers, dated July 15, 2009, addressing the mandatory deference to CAMCO in the use and operation of the EWNS (and the REVERSE 911® System) in the event of a County-wide emergency, as explained in and required by that Resolution); in summary, in the event of a County-wide emergency, such as a hurricane heading towards this area, the REVERSE 911® System's use is controlled (for such County-wide emergencies only) exclusively by CAMCO, as reiterated in Schedule F, a true and correct copy of a May 21, 2010 Press Release addressing the advent of the CCECD EWNS, which is attached hereto.

F.

In the event of a conflict between the two said protocols, (1) Schedule C (the General EWNS Protocol for Cameron County, Texas of the CCECD Board Of Managers) and (2) Schedule D (the Specific EWNS/EAS Protocol Manual for Cameron County, Texas), the General EWNS Protocol (Schedule C) governs and controls, except for technical matters and specific operational procedures.

III.

#### Payment

Α.

Unless otherwise indicated in this Master Use Agreement, no user of the EWNS, as described above (i.e., the eight Primary PSAPs and CAMCO's Emergency Management Division), or CCECD, STECF or CAMCO (even if functioning solely as a "user"), are required to pay any sum of money for using or operating the CCECD EWNS.

R

The parties hereto agree that the consideration for the execution of this Agreement has been received by each (other) party, as appropriate.

IV.

#### Term Of Agreement

Α.

The term of this Agreement shall be one (1) year, commencing June 1, 2011 and ending May 31, 2012, which shall automatically renew, unless notice to the contrary is delivered to CCECD, STECF and CAMCO (all three), by any of the said (eight) Primary PSAPs.

R

All of the provisions of this Agreement shall survive the execution and performance of this instrument, as well as the expiration of any such term.

٧.

#### Termination

This Agreement may be terminated (a) as to any party desiring to "opt out" of this Agreement, for cause (including any action constituting a breach of the terms of this Agreement), by that party, as appropriate, (b) by mutual agreement of the parties, or (c) in the event of any occurrence (e.g., bankruptcy, dissolution or governmental action, as appropriate) precluding any party from performing the obligations contemplated under this Agreement.

VI.

#### Insurance

All parties agree to obtain insurance (to the extent available) in the type and amount deemed advisable to protect their respective interests; to this extent, the parties agree to provide insurance for their respective employees, conveyances, equipment, facilities and instrumentalities, as appropriate.

VII.

#### Status Of Parties

The parties do <u>not</u> have the relationship of partners, joint venturers, principal-agent or employer-employee; the parties are separate entities who enter into this Agreement for their respective benefit.

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VIII.

#### Entire Agreement

Α.

This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties relating to the rights granted herein and the obligations assumed herein, and supersedes any prior understandings, representations, memorandums or agreements regarding the service relationship that is the subject of this Agreement.

В.

Any oral representations or modifications concerning this instrument shall be of no force or effect; this Agreement may be amended, provided that no amendment, modification or alteration of the terms of this Agreement shall be binding unless set forth in writing and signed by both parties.

IX.

#### Law Governing; Venue

THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE GOVERNED BY AND CONSTRUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS (AND WHERE APPLICABLE, THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA); FURTHER, THE OBLIGATIONS AND UNDERTAKINGS OF EACH OF THE PARTIES TO THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE PERFORMABLE IN CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS.

Χ.

#### Waiver

Any waiver by any party of any default under or breach of this Agreement shall not constitute a continuing waiver of such default or breach, or a waiver of or permission for (express or implied) any other or subsequent default or breach.

XI.

#### Assignment

This Agreement shall not be assigned in whole or in part by any party without the approval of CCECD, STECF <u>and</u> CAMCO, set forth in writing and signed by those parties; any assignee will be bound by the terms of this Agreement.

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XII.

#### Warranties Or Representations

Α.

ALL PARTIES TO THIS AGREEMENT SPECIFICALLY ACKNOWLEDGE THAT NO WARRANTY OR REPRESENTATION OF ANY KIND WHATSOEVER IS BEING MADE BY ANY PARTY IN CONNECTION WITH THE EXECUTION OR PERFORMANCE OF THIS AGREEMENT, except as is set forth in this instrument.

ALL PARTIES AGREE TO RELEASE AND HOLD HARMLESS ALL OTHER (PARTIES) FOR ANY AND ALL CLAIMS ARISING FROM THE ENTRY INTO, THE EXECUTION OF, THE ENFORCEMENT OF, OR THE INTERPRETATION OF THIS AGREEMENT.

XIII.

#### Parties Bound

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties to this Agreement and their respective heirs, legal representatives, successors and assigns, as appropriate; however, there are no third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement.

XIV.

#### Notice

Α.

Any notice to any party shall be in writing and sent by certified or registered mail, telefax, courier or hand-delivery, addressed to that party as set forth above, at that party's address set forth above or such other address as may be designated.

ANY DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM ARISING UNDER OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, OR THE BREACH, TERMINATION OR INVALIDITY THEREOF, SHALL BE SETTLED (EXCEPT WHERE THE PARTIES HERETO RESOLVE ANY SUCH DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM BY AGREEMENT) BY ARBITRATION ONLY (I.E., ANY SUCH DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM WILL NOT BE RESOLVED BY OR THROUGH ANY COURT OR JUDICIAL PROCEEDING, AND FURTHER, THERE SHALL BE NO PRE-TRIAL DISCOVERY), IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FEDERAL ARBITRATION ACT AND THE COMMERCIAL ARBITRATION RULES OF THE AMERICAN ARBITRATION ASSOCIATION (THIS DOES NOT REQUIRE THE USE OF SUCH ASSOCIATION AND SUCH RULES ARE ONLY PROCEDURES FOR THE ARBITRATION), USING ONE ARBITRATOR, TO BE SELECTED BY AGREEMENT OF THE PARTIES -- SUCH ARBITRATION TO BE CONDUCTED IN BROWNSVILLE, CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS, IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE -- AND A JUDGMENT UPON THE AWARD RENDERED BY THE ARBITRATOR MAY BE ENTERED IN ANY COURT HAVING JURISDICTION THEREOF.

If any proceeding is initiated to resolve a dispute arising under or relating to this Agreement by either of the parties hereto, it is expressly agreed that the prevailing party, as defined in <u>Black's Law Dictionary</u> 1352 (Rev. 4th ed. 1968) (<u>Prevailing Party</u>) (a copy of which is attached), shall be entitled to recover from the other party reasonable attorney fees, costs and expenses, in addition to any other (including but not limited to declaratory, injunctive or monetary) relief that may be awarded.

XVI.

#### Invalidity

Α.

If any term, provision, covenant or condition of this Agreement is held by the said arbitrator to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, the remainder of those provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated.

It is the intention of the parties to this Agreement that in lieu of each clause or provision of this Agreement that is held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, there be added as a part of this Agreement a clause or provision as similar in terms to such invalid, illegal or unenforceable clause or provision as is possible which shall nevertheless be valid, legal and enforceable.

XVII.

#### Construction Of Instrument

Α.

Each of the parties hereto has counsel or has had the opportunity to be represented by counsel in regard to the negotiation and drafting of this Agreement; accordingly, this Agreement shall not be construed in favor of any party.

As used in this Agreement, whenever the context so indicates, (1) the masculine, feminine or neuter gender, (2) the singular or plural number, and (3) the individual or corporate capacity, shall each be deemed to include the others.

C.

It is the specific intention of the parties to this Agreement that this Agreement constitutes a final and executed instrument binding upon all of the parties to the said instrument.

XVIII.

#### Authority

A.

The parties to this Agreement warrant and represent that (1) the signatories below are authorized to act on behalf of the respective party to this instrument, (2) the signatories have been authorized to execute this instrument by the said parties in accordance with the requisite corporate formalities of each such party, (3) the execution of this instrument by the said signatories constitutes the binding act of each such party to this instrument, and (4) the execution of this instrument and the adoption of same by each party is authorized by law.

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CCECD, STECF and CAMCO, along with the said (eight) Primary PSAPs, hereby certify that pursuant to the respective legal authority under which each party was formed, each party is authorized to enter into this Agreement.

XIX.

#### Compliance With Law

The parties will act, at all times, in compliance with all pertinent and applicable laws.

XX.

#### Force Majeure

In the event that any party shall be prevented from completing performance of its respective obligations hereunder by an "act of God" or any other occurrence whatsoever which is beyond the control of the parties, then that party shall be excused from any further performance of its obligations and undertakings under this Agreement, provided that, in the event that any such performance is only interrupted or delayed, the affected party shall only be excused from that performance for that period of time as is reasonably necessary after such occurrence to remedy the effects thereof.

# Pre-Initiation Requirements

Α.

Prior to any initiation of the EWNS, a participating jurisdiction is responsible for the following:

- 1 Confirming to CCECD that the jurisdiction has established its own protocol, policies and procedures as to those governmental personnel authorized to request initiation of the EWNS for the participating jurisdiction, and the protocol, policies and procedures to be utilized.
- 2 Agreeing that the participating jurisdiction requesting initiation of the EWNS will be referred to as the "initiator" of the Reverse 911® notification, and that the protocol for initiating such notification, as set forth below, will result in the Reverse 911® "launchers" commencing the notification process (the "launchers" work with CCECD but operate out of a distinct dispatching center, which will be referred to as the Reverse 911® "facility").
- 3 Completing CCECD-provided training, in conjunction with the establishment of the participating jurisdiction's (own) protocols.

В.

CCECD shall be responsible for the following:

- 1 Issuing ID codes and personal passwords for those individuals authorized to initiate the EWNS for a jurisdiction (See Paragraph II.A.1. above); personal passwords are valid indefinitely, subject to change, when deemed to be necessary by CCECD.
- 2 Setting the number of attempts for call completion CCECD must make before a specific call is abandoned, which number will be set with input from CCECD's participating jurisdictions, but the ultimate decision will be made by CCECD's Board; the designated number of attempts must be the same for all jurisdictions participating in the EWNS.

III.

# Initiation

Α.

The EWNS "facility," utilizing Reverse 911® (technology), upon an authorized request (with validation from a participating jurisdiction), shall "launch" the EWNS, but again, the EWNS is to be used only for emergency calls.

В.

A participating jurisdiction shall request that an area be notified based on a determined polygon, an intersection and specified radius, or an address and specified radius.

C.

A participating jurisdiction will request the use of a prerecorded message or of a dynamic message, which will be entered, at the EWNS "facility," through the said "launcher"; examples of prerecorded messages (which will be available in English <u>and</u> Spanish) might be as follows:

- 1 "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MESSAGE. A CHEMICAL SPILL HAS OCCURRED IN YOUR AREA. YOU ARE INSTRUCTED TO SHELTER IN PLACE."
- 2 "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MESSAGE. A CHEMICAL SPILL HAS OCCURRED IN YOUR AREA. YOU ARE INSTRUCTED TO EVACUATE YOUR AREA."

D.

Any authorized personnel designated by their jurisdictions can initiate the system, modify the initiation, or end the initiation.

Ε.

An incomplete call will be re-tried according to the number of attempts authorized in Paragraph II.B.2. above.

F.

When a telephone with a "Caller ID feature" receives an EWNS call, the phrase "CAMERON 911" will appear on the "Caller ID" screen.

When all of the said calls have been completed, the EWNS "facility" will notify the participating jurisdiction(s) that requested the initiation.

# Security

Α.

The EWNS "facility" will issue participating jurisdictions identification codes and personal passwords for the purpose of validating the request for an initiation of the EWNS.

Periodically, CCECD will verify authorized personnel with the participating jurisdiction(s).

# Payment

# Initiation Follow-Up

Α.

The use of the EWNS will generate a variety of reports; these reports will be made available to the participating jurisdictions, which reports are to include criteria set forth below in Exhibit B.

These reports may be sent to the participating jurisdictions via e-mail, telefax, regular mail or hand-delivery.

VII.

# Training/Public Education

Α.

CCECD will provide <u>call initiation protocols</u> to the said participating jurisdictions, as referred to in Paragraphs II. (Pre-Initiation Requirements) and III. (Initiation) above.

CCECD will train appropriate personnel from each participating jurisdiction in all phases of the proper <u>procedures</u> to be used to request an initiation.

С.

Each participating jurisdiction will be responsible for training its own personnel about these procedures.

D.

CCECD, in conjunction with the participating jurisdictions, will provide public education on the existence and use of the EWNS (i.e., Reverse  $911^{\circ}$ ).

# Updates To EWNS Protocol

The CCECD Board Of Managers shall continue to review (periodically) the EWNS (i.e., Reverse 911[®]), and recommendations for new or changed procedures in this Protocol will be addressed by the Board, with the input of the Director Of Communication; such recommendations will be submitted to the participating jurisdictions for (their) response, and finally, to the CCECD Board for formal approval and adoption, although the final decision as to any changes to this Protocol is to be made by the CCECD Board.

BE IT RESOLVED that on the 15th day of April, 2009, the Board Of Managers of the Cameron County Emergency Communication District (CCECD) convened, and the following item was placed on the Agenda of the Board for such meeting, pursuant to Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code (the Texas Open Meetings Act), to be considered:

"Consideration of and authorization to establish an Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) in Cameron County, for certain emergencies, utilizing the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) in Cameron County, pursuant to Section 772.307 of the Texas Health & Safety Code, and authorizing a resolution (Order # 2009-1) to memorialize the same."

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 772.307 of the Texas Health & Safety Code (Powers And Duties Of Board [authorizing the Board to "adopt rules for the operation of the district"]), the Board was to consider the establishment of an Early Warning Notification System (EWNS) in Cameron County, for certain emergencies, utilizing the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) in Cameron County, in light of recently developed technology allowing for telephone line users/owners to be notified through their telephone of emergency situations, through the 9-1-1 ETNS, utilizing Reverse 911® (technology).

WHEREAS, the CCECD Board, having considered the testimony of the members of the Board, the Director Of Communication, the Deputy Director, representatives of AT&T, representatives of (the "government" of) Cameron County, representatives of emergency service providers throughout Cameron County, and the public, is of the opinion that Reverse 911® should be established in Cameron County, by CCECD, as a positive addition to the existing 9-1-1 ETNS in this county, which will be implemented pursuant to a Protocol of CCECD addressing the operation of the EWNS in Cameron County, which Protocol will be adopted herein.

WHEREAS, the CCECD Board, upon consideration of the proposal, finds that the said EWNS should be implemented in Cameron County and the said Protocol should be adopted by the CCECD Board.

# EARLY WARNING NOTIFICATION SYSTEM (EWNS) PROTOCOL (CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS)

I.

# Introduction

Α.

At the request of various participating jurisdictions, the Cameron County Emergency Communication (9-1-1) District (CCECD) agreed to expand the Emergency Telephone Number Service (ETNS) to include the provision of an Early Warning Notification System (ETNS), in conjunction with AT&T and Reverse 911®, using Reverse 911® (technology); the following provisions set forth the rules or procedures governing the EWNS implemented by CCECD for Cameron County, using Reverse 911® (technology).

В.

The participating jurisdictions in the ETNS are not required to use the EWNS to provide early warning notifications to their residents; those participating jurisdictions that do use the EWNS, however, agree to use the EWNS according to the "protocol" (i.e., procedures or regulations) set forth herein.

С.

The EWNS is an <u>additional</u> tool available to jurisdictions for the protection of their residents and <u>not in lieu of</u> other existing tools, as the EWNS is for <u>emergencies only</u>; thus, the efficient use of a shared and scarce resource mandates that the EWNS be reserved for use in life-threatening emergencies that require rapid notification of large numbers of people.

D.

The determination of what constitutes an emergency qualifying for the use of the EWNS is to be made by each participating jurisdiction, subject to this Protocol, and examples of such emergencies are listed below in Exhibit A; as there is great caution in the use of the 9-1-1 ETNS by people so as not "tie up" 9-1-1 lines for non-emergency reasons, the participating jurisdictions must strictly adhere to the "emergency use only" requirement so as to not "tie up" or use the EWNS with or for any non-emergency use.

# EARLY WARNING NOTIFICATION SYSTEM (EWNS/EAS) CALL INITIATION PROTOCOL MANUAL (CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS)

#### Introduction

The REVERSE 911® System involves a reverse emergency communication system capable of providing critical incident notifications to wire-line, cellular or Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) telephones within the boundaries of Cameron County. The REVERSE 911® System utilizes the CCECD 9-1-1 Automatic Location Identification (ALI) feature of AT&T's database in conjunction with its own polygon mapping applications to launch critical alerts. Wireless numbers are maintained by the user through a self-registration portal; it is required that when new wireless telephone service is activated in Cameron County, the resident desiring REVERSE 911® System emergency or disaster alerts must login to the REVERSE 911® System via the CCECD website or contacting (855) 879-1911 and entering their correct wireless telephone numbers. CCECD staff will validate the resident's information for approval. Other REVERSE 911® System alerts such as Hazmat, Swat, Fire, Epidemic, etc., will use a combination of the ALI database and emergency/disaster alert registered numbers to inform residents of those particular crisis situations. Periodically, the ALI database will be sent to the REVERSE 911® System servers by the CCECD in order to synchronize databases accordingly.

# **REVERSE 911® System Utilization**

It is essential to understand that the REVERSE 911® System is an additional tool available within Cameron County for the protection of its residents, and is not a substitute for other existing emergency reporting or response tools. The REVERSE 911® System is to be only used for **Major Emergencies** which impact multiple entities or residents within specific geographic areas as determined by emergency dispatch and response agencies. Examples of such emergencies can be found in Exhibit A of this document. Just as residents should take great caution in using the 9-1-1 system so as not to overburden it for non-emergency reasons, those authorized to "launch alerts" must adhere to the "major emergency-use-only" requirement so as not to overload the system with less than "major impact" emergencies. Overutilization of the REVERSE 911® System could also result in a lack of attention and response by residents who may receive numerous (unnecessary) alert calls. The Cameron County REVERSE 911® System is not intended for use as a public announcement or information system, except for major emergencies as described above.

# A. Pre-activation requirements

 Prior to the activation of the REVERSE 911® System, each agency authorized to "launch" a REVERSE 911® System alert is responsible for the following:

Reverse 911 - March 2011

- a. Identifying authorized individuals who will be assigned to launch the alerts. The STECF "Med Com dispatch center," the REVERSE 911® System "facility," will have REVERSE 911® System "Alert Launch Authority" on a 7 day/week, 24 hour/day, 365 day/year basis. In addition, the Cameron County (CAMCO) Emergency Management Division will also have the direct authority to launch these alerts.
- b. Each authorized agency must be able to identify the exact geographic area that is impacted by a crisis situation.
- c. Prior to being authorized to launch a REVERSE 911® System alert, all pertinent agencies must complete CCECD REVERSE 911® System training.
- 2. South Texas Emergency Care Foundation (STECF) shall be responsible for the following:
  - a. Entering into and maintaining on the REVERSE 911® System the names of REVERSE 911® System "Alert Launch Authorized" personnel. Requests made from a person who is not authorized will not be accepted; as to (Texas) DPS or other state officials, they will utilize the statewide emergency communications system, as appropriate.
  - b. Administering REVERSE 911® System applications, databases and security, but this does <u>not</u> include REVERSE 911® System "launch" responsibilities, except in <u>extreme</u> circumstances (i.e., when the other "Launch Authorities" are unable to meet the said criteria).
  - c. Providing updates and statistics to pertinent agencies as to the use of the REVERSE 911® System alerts in order to track the System's effectiveness.

# B. Activation

1. The agencies authorized to launch REVERSE 911® System alerts will be the Dispatch Centers at the eight Primary PSAPs in Cameron County (which does not include STECF) and the Cameron County Emergency Management Division. Alerts, as required, will be launched in consultation with the dispatch authorities of the Cameron County law enforcement, fire suppression and prevention, emergency medical services and health agencies, depending on the type of alert required and the location of the emergency. In all cases, the Launch Authority issuing an alert should notify other dispatch centers and other "Alert Launch Authorities" of the action, in order to avoid confusion in responding to an emergency (taking into account that in the event of a County-wide emergency, all such launches are subordinate, at that time, to the County Emergency Management Division).

- 2. Launch Authorized personnel are responsible for the security of their individual launch codes, and must assure that the codes are <u>not</u> shared or distributed to unauthorized individuals. Each dispatching "department" will determine appropriate disciplinary action, based on their own codes of conduct, should a code security infraction or breach occur.
- 3. An emergency must be significant and severe, in terms of public health or safety, to warrant the activation of a REVERSE 911® System emergency message. Examples include but are not limited to hazardous material releases, fires, active shooters, etc. See Exhibit A for more examples.

The requesting agency should call South Texas Emergency Care Foundation (STECF) directly at 956/444-0911 to request activation of the REVERSE 911® System.

- a. Activation messages should be no more than 30 seconds in length, and not exceed 60 seconds. Messages exceeding 30 seconds will affect system performance and result in less successful call deliveries.
- b. The Authorized Launch Agency should be careful to word messages in a precise manner, within the parameters described above.
- 4. A Launch Authority will be able to use a pre-recorded message or scenario. The System <u>also</u> supports texting and c-mail alert messages. Examples of prerecorded messages are as follows:
  - a. "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MESSAGE FROM CAMERON COUNTY THAT MAY AFFECT YOUR AREA."

#### OR

- b. "THIS IS AN EMERGENCY MESSAGE. A CHEMICAL SPILL HAS OCCURRED IN YOUR AREA. YOU ARE INSTRUCTED TO SHELTER IN PLACE."
- An unsuccessful call will be re-tried three times, using default parameters established within the REVERSE 911® System.

# C. Security

- STECF will appoint an "overall" REVERSE 911® System Administrator, who
  will provide necessary training and logins to Authorized Launch Personnel from
  the Authorized Launch Centers.
- The Launch Authorities should maintain updated lists of REVERSE 911® System
   Authorized Personnel for the pertinent situation and should use secure methods to
   protect sensitive REVERSE 911® System information pertaining to launch
   requests and activation.

 STECF has "overall security administration responsibility" for the REVERSE 911® System applications and is the <u>only</u> entity authorized to <u>administer</u> REVERSE 911® System access <u>and</u> certification.

# D. Activation Follow Up

- The REVERSE 911® System can generate a variety of reports for each Launch Authority. These reports are available, within the scope of authorization, for the release of REVERSE 911® System information. See Exhibit B for some reports available via the REVERSE 911® System.
- STECF will produce Alert Reports as needed to track the use of the System for major emergency situations.

# E. Training/Public Education

- STECF will provide Call Activation Protocols to Launch Authorized Agencies only.
- 2. STECF will train appropriate personnel, from each Authorized Launch Center, about all phases of the proper procedures to complete an alert activation.
- STECF, in conjunction with the said participating agencies, will provide "public education" on the existence and use of the REVERSE 911® System (as augmented by the CCECD Public Education Program).

# F. Updates to the REVERSE 911® System Call Initiation Protocol Manual

This Manual is a living document subject to changes agreed upon by all pertinent parties. As the REVERSE 911 ® System in Cameron County matures through use, changes to this Manual may be required to make the operational and administrative processes more efficient. As such, the following "changes" to this Manual will be available:

- Ordinary changes: REVERSE 911® System users can make recommendations for new or changed protocols/procedures. These recommendations will be processed through the STECF REVERSE 911® System Administrator, and such recommendations will be submitted to the participating Launch Authorities for review, and finally to the CCECD Board Of Managers for approval and adoption, in accordance with CCECD Orders, Protocols and Agreements.
- Special changes: STECF reserves the right to make changes to these protocols as circumstances dictate. In this regard, STECF decisions about the need for changes may be dictated by upgrades to the REVERSE 911® System applications,

- command and input changes, and the like. STECF will keep all pertinent agencies informed of such changes and will revise the said training, as required.
- CCECD makes every effort to provide the most advanced notification system that
  is available; however, since many factors are beyond CCECD's control, no
  guarantee or warranty of any kind whatsoever is made that the System will be
  available or will perform successfully every time.

# G. Master Use Agreement

This (Specific) Call Initiation Protocol Manual is addressed in the CCECD Emergency Warning Notification System (EWNS) Master Use Agreement; further, this Manual appears as Schedule D to that Agreement, and constitutes a part of that Agreement.

WHEREAS, in the event of certain emergencies, once the EWNS, also known as "Reverse 911®," is activated, a participating jurisdiction in Cameron County (a municipality or the County) could initiate a "Reverse 911" telephone call to warn a selected area of a hazardous material leak, an explosion, a building collapse and so forth.

WHEREAS, if the emergency involved a <u>local</u> matter, such as an escape from a jail or a large fire, as distinguished from a <u>County-wide</u> matter, such as a hurricane, individual municipalities can work independently to address any such emergency.

WHEREAS, if the emergency involved a hurricane, different participating jurisdictions could conflict with each other in the handling of such a large-scale emergency situation, involving possible road closures, evacuations and the like, requiring centralized emergency management.

WHEREAS, in the event of such a <u>large-scale</u> emergency situation, The State Of Texas, according to the Governor's Office and its Emergency Management Division, is "in charge," but that authority is <u>delegated</u> to the "local" political subdivision of the State, which is Cameron County, by and through the Cameron County Judge.

This agreement is made and entered into pursuant to Chapter 775 of the Texas Health & Safety Code, by and between the Cameron County Emergency Services District No. 1, hereinafter referred to as "DISTRICT," acting by and through its undersigned President, and the Town of South Padre Island, located in Cameron County, Texas, hereinafter referred to as "PROVIDER," acting by and through its undersigned Mayor, both signatories having been authorized to execute this agreement upon an affirmative majority vote of their respective governing boards.

In consideration of the mutual covenants, agreements and benefits to both parties, it is AGREED as follows:

I.

# PROVISION OF SERVICES

Α.

During the term of this agreement, PROVIDER agrees to furnish "firefighting" services - defined as "the use of personnel and equipment to fight, extinguish and suppress fires," and what has been (historically) understood to be part of the duties of a fire department, including the handling of "hazardous material incidents" or the provision of "rescue services," but this does not include the prevention or investigation of fires, or related training, education, maintenance, communications or administration - to the unincorporated area of Cameron County designated as Zone Number 6 on the Official Fire Protection Service Zone Map of the DISTRICT, which is incorporated by reference herein as if fully copied and set forth at length; a complete "definition" of these terms, and what is (or is not) included in those terms (above) are set forth in the Appendix to this Contract, which is incorporated by reference herein as if fully copied and set forth at length.

В.

While the purpose of this map is to define generally the PROVIDER's main area of responsibility, such a designation does not

limit the PROVIDER's duty to respond to other areas within the DISTRICT should the need arise; therefore, it is expressly agreed that when, in the judgment of the PROVIDER's Fire Chief, an emergency demands the response of the PROVIDER's firefighting services outside of Zone Number 6, the PROVIDER shall be obligated to respond.

C.

will conduct itself in conformity with the PROVIDER requirements and standards of emergency services firefighting) provided in this State, in accordance with any applicable state standards; to this extent, the PROVIDER will perform all acts necessary to successfully fulfill the purpose of this Agreement and shall, at all times, faithfully, industriously and to the best of its abilities, experience and talents, perform all the duties that may be required of and from it pursuant to the express and implicit terms hereof and to the reasonable satisfaction of the DISTRICT.

D.

To confirm the ability of the PROVIDER to perform services required under this Agreement and to otherwise confirm compliance with the performance anticipated and required under this Agreement by the said PROVIDER, the DISTRICT reserves the right to have its consultant or any other authorized agent or employee (at the appropriate time) contact the PROVIDER and inspect the PROVIDER's facilities, equipment and personnel to confirm the provision of same and the adequacy of same (as regards the status of such equipment and facilities or the training of such personnel, as appropriate), in contemplation of reporting same to the Board Of Emergency Services Commissioners of the DISTRICT.

II.

# COMPENSATION

Α.

DISTRICT agrees to pay, subject to the availability of funds, the sum of \$64,929.83 per year to the PROVIDER for firefighting services in the said unincorporated areas, generally designated in Paragraph I of this agreement; the DISTRICT agrees said sum is to be paid to the PROVIDER in quarterly installments of \$16,232.46 on or about the following dates: December 31st, March 31st, June 30th and September 30th.

The parties hereto also agree that the DISTRICT will reimburse the PROVIDER for the costs of cleaning and purifying the firefighting apparatus due to any salt content that results from utilizing water from the bay to extinguish fires in the Sea Ranch Restaurant/Grocery Store & Marina Complex or any other County (Park) property; should the DISTRICT fail to reimburse the PROVIDER for such expenses within thirty (30) days after receiving a notice to remit a payment, the Contract will terminate after a fifteen (15) day Notice Of Termination is given to the DISTRICT and if, by the end of such period, the DISTRICT failed to cure such default.

C.

It is agreed that as a <u>condition</u> <u>precedent</u> to payment, the PROVIDER shall provide to the <u>DISTRICT</u> a written report summarizing the services rendered to the <u>DISTRICT</u> during the term of this Contract, with all such reports (for <u>each</u> "fire call") describing the particular incident, in accordance with a standardized Fire Call Reporting Form, a copy of which is attached to this Contract (after the said Appendix), and all such reports shall be due by 2:00 p.m. on the tenth day of the next month after the date of the incident reported on that Form.

D.

However, notwithstanding the foregoing, PROVIDER shall not, in any event, be required to provide to the DISTRICT, or include in any such report, any privileged, confidential or private information regarding any patient or person for whom ambulance or emergency medical services have been provided, including but not limited to name, address, medical condition or treatment information, or any other information determined by PROVIDER to be protected from disclosure under any applicable federal or state law or regulation.

E.

It is, therefore, agreed that no payment (for the relevant quarter) of the foregoing compensation will be made, unless and until the said (required) report is tendered to the DISTRICT, in a timely manner (no later than the due date referred to above), and in the event of a late tender of such report, the foregoing compensation will not be paid to the said PROVIDER for that quarter.

# III.

#### TERM OF AGREEMENT

The term of the Agreement shall be one year, beginning October 1, 2011, and ending September 30, 2012, but the provisions of this agreement shall survive the termination and/or expiration of this agreement.

IV.

# TERMINATION/RENEWAL

Α.

This contract may be terminated at will by either party sixty days after the other party is sent written notice from the party desiring termination.

в.

If the PROVIDER does not intend to renew this Contract after the fiscal year covered by this Contract, the PROVIDER shall provide the DISTRICT with written notice of its intent to terminate, by United States Mail, return receipt requested, not later than June 1, 2012; this 120 day notice is required to allow the DISTRICT to have sufficient time to secure alternate firefighting services in such event.

C.

In the event the PROVIDER fails to notify the DISTRICT of its intention not to renew this Contract, the DISTRICT may assume and rely upon such assumption that the PROVIDER will renew this Contract upon the same terms and conditions set forth in this instrument.

D.

Should the PROVIDER intend to renegotiate this Contract, the DISTRICT shall be notified in writing of same by United States mail, return receipt requested, not later than June 1, 2012; if such negotiations have not been completed on or before October 1, 2011, both the PROVIDER and the DISTRICT expressly agree to act in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract for a period of thirty days thereafter. If, during such time, both parties fail to negotiate a new contract, the said negotiation

period shall terminate on the thirtieth (30th) day of said period; however, the contract obligations of both parties shall be extended for an additional thirty days beyond the end of the said negotiation period to allow the DISTRICT time to secure alternate firefighting services. At the end of this second negotiation period, this Contract shall terminate.

# ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Contract shall comprise the entire agreement between the parties hereto and any amendment shall be enforceable only after being reduced to writing, executed by the parties hereto and attached hereto.

VI.

# LAW GOVERNING/VENUE

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of The State Of Texas and shall be performable in Cameron County, Texas.

VII.

# ACT OF GOD EXCUSES PERFORMANCE

In the event that either party shall be prevented from completing performance of their respective obligations hereunder by an act of God or any other occurrence whatsoever which is beyond the control of the parties hereto, then such party shall be excused from any further performance of its obligations and undertakings hereunder, but only for the period of time after such occurrence that same is necessary.

#### VIII.

# EXCLUSIVITY

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Board Of Emergency Service Commissioners, the governing board (body) of the DISTRICT, the said PROVIDER is granted the exclusive right to and the exclusive responsibility for, during the term of this Agreement, the provision of all firefighting services, as defined above and as contemplated by this Contract, originating or occurring in the said Zone (Number 6) of the DISTRICT, regardless of the manner and method in which any request for such service is conveyed.

#### IX.

#### ARBITRATION

ANY DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM ARISING FROM OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, OR THE BREACH, TERMINATION OR INVALIDITY THEREOF, SHALL BE SETTLED BY ARBITRATION IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FEDERAL ARBITRATION ACT AND THE COMMERCIAL ARBITRATION RULES OF THE AMERICAN ARBITRATION ASSOCIATION (THIS DOES NOT REQUIRE THE USE OF SUCH ASSOCIATION, AND SUCH RULES ARE ONLY PROCEDURES FOR THE ARBITRATION), USING ONE ARBITRATOR -- SUCH ARBITRATION TO BE CONDUCTED IN BROWNSVILLE, CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE -- AND A JUDGMENT UPON THE AWARD RENDERED BY THE ARBITRATOR MAY BE ENTERED IN ANY COURT HAVING JURISDICTION THEREOF.

In consideration of the mutual covenants, agreements and benefits to both parties, it is AGREED as follows:

I.

#### PROVISION OF SERVICES

Α.

During the term of this Agreement, PROVIDER agrees to furnish ambulance and emergency medical services to the unincorporated area of Cameron County designated as Zone Number 6 on the Official Ambulance Service Zone Map of the DISTRICT, which is incorporated herein by reference and hereby made a part of this Agreement.

В.

While the purpose of this map is to define generally the PROVIDER's main area of service responsibility, such a designation does not limit the PROVIDER's duty to respond to other areas within the DISTRICT should the need arise; therefore, it is expressly agreed that when, in the judgment of the PROVIDER's Director Of Emergency Medical Services, an emergency needs the response of the PROVIDER's ambulance and emergency medical services outside of Zone Number 5, the PROVIDER may respond.

C.

PROVIDER will conduct itself in conformity with the requirements and standards of emergency services (i.e.,

firefighting) provided in this State, in accordance with any applicable state standards; to this extent, the PROVIDER will perform all acts necessary to successfully fulfill the purpose of this Agreement and shall, at all times, faithfully, industriously and to the best of its abilities, experience and talents, perform all the duties that may be required of and from it pursuant to the express and implicit terms hereof and to the reasonable satisfaction of the DISTRICT.

D.

To confirm the ability of the PROVIDER to perform services required under this Agreement and to otherwise confirm compliance with the performance anticipated and required under this Agreement by the said PROVIDER, the DISTRICT reserves the right to have its consultant or any other authorized agent or employee (at the appropriate time) contact the PROVIDER and inspect the PROVIDER's facilities, equipment and personnel to confirm the provision of same and the adequacy of same (as regards to the status of such equipment and facilities or the training of such personnel, as appropriate), in contemplation of reporting same to the Board of Emergency Services Commissioners of the District.

II.

### COMPENSATION

Α.

DISTRICT agrees to pay, subject to the availability of funds, the sum of \$32,168.68 per year to the PROVIDER for ambulance and emergency medical services in the said unincorporated areas generally designated in Paragraph I of this Agreement; the DISTRICT agrees said sum is to be paid to the PROVIDER in quarterly installments of \$8,042.17 on or about the following dates: December 31st, March 31st, June 30th and September 30th.

В.

It is agreed further that as a condition precedent to payment, the PROVIDER shall provide to the DISTRICT a written report summarizing the services rendered to the DISTRICT, with said report listing all calls, by date, location and nature, made on behalf of the DISTRICT; this report shall be due fifteen (15) days after the pertinent payment period (set forth in the paragraph above) ends and shall be printed on reporting forms provided by the DISTRICT.

However, notwithstanding the foregoing, PROVIDER shall not, in any event, be required to provide to the DISTRICT, or include in any such report, any privileged, confidential or private information regarding any patient or person for whom ambulance or emergency medical services have been provided, including but not limited to name, address, medical condition or treatment information, or any other information determined by PROVIDER to be protected from disclosure under any applicable federal or state law or regulation.

D.

It is, therefore, agreed that no payment (for the relevant quarter) of the foregoing compensation will be made, unless and until the said (required) report is tendered to the DISTRICT, in a timely manner (no later than the due date referred to above), and in the event of a late tender of such report, the foregoing compensation will not be paid to the said PROVIDER for that quarter.

III.

### TERM OF AGREEMENT

The term of this Agreement shall be one year, beginning October 1, 2011 and ending September 30, 2012, but the provisions of this Agreement shall survive the termination and/or expiration of this Agreement.

IV.

#### TERMINATION/RENEWAL

A.

This contract may be terminated at will by either party sixty days after the other party is sent written notice from the party desiring termination.

В.

If the PROVIDER does not intend to renew this Contract after the fiscal year covered by this Contract, the PROVIDER shall provide the DISTRICT with written notice of its intent to terminate, by United States Mail, return receipt requested, not later than June 1, 2012; this 120 day notice is required to allow

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the DISTRICT to have sufficient time to secure alternate ambulance and emergency medical services in such event.

C.

In the event the PROVIDER fails to notify the DISTRICT of its intention not to renew this Contract, the DISTRICT may assume and rely upon such assumption that the PROVIDER will renew this Contract upon the same terms and conditions set forth in this instrument.

D.

Should the PROVIDER intend to renegotiate this Contract, the DISTRICT shall be notified in writing of same, by United States Mail, return receipt requested, not later than June 1, 2012; if such negotiations have not been completed on or before October 1, 2012, both the PROVIDER and the DISTRICT expressly agree to act in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract for a period of thirty days thereafter. If, during such time, both parties fail to negotiate a new contract, the negotiation period shall terminate on the thirtieth (30th) day of said period; however, the contract obligations of both parties shall be extended for an additional thirty days beyond the end of the said negotiation period to allow the DISTRICT time to secure alternate ambulance and emergency medical services. At the end of this second (negotiation) period, this Contract shall terminate.

٧.

#### INDEMNITY

The PROVIDER shall indemnify, protect and hold harmless the DISTRICT, its commissioners, officers, agents, representatives, successors, assigns and insurers, from any and all liabilities, claims, demands, actions, losses, damages and costs, including all costs of defense thereof, of any nature whatsoever, for injury to or death of persons or loss or damage to property, or for any other reason, arising from the execution of or performance (or non-performance) of this Agreement, and including any claims and actions based upon the acts or omissions of the PROVIDER or its respective directors, officers, agents, employees, representatives, successors and assigns.

В.

Upon demand, the PROVIDER shall, at its own expense, defend the DISTRICT, its commissioners, officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns, against any and all such liabilities, claims, demands, actions, losses, damages and costs; moreover, the PROVIDER shall give the DISTRICT prompt notice of any claim within its knowledge that in any way, directly or indirectly, affects either party. Both parties shall have the right to participate in the defense of such claim to the extent of their interests.

VI.

### ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Contract shall comprise the entire Agreement between the parties hereto and any amendment shall be enforceable only after being reduced to writing, executed by the parties hereto and attached hereto.

VII.

#### LAW GOVERNING/VENUE

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of The State of Texas and shall be performable in Cameron County, Texas.

VIII.

### ACT OF GOD EXCUSES PERFORMANCE

In the event that either party shall be prevented from completing performance of its respective obligations hereunder by an act of God or any other occurrence whatsoever which is beyond the control of the parties hereto, then such party shall be excused from any further performance of its obligations and undertakings hereunder, but only for the period of time after such occurrence that same is necessary.

IX.

### EXCLUSIVITY

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Board Of Emergency Services Commissioners, the governing board (body) of the DISTRICT, the said PROVIDER is granted the exclusive right to and the exclusive responsibility for, during the term of this Agreement, the provision of all emergency and non-emergency ambulance and emergency medical services, including special events coverage, as contemplated by this Contract, originating or occurring in the said Zone (Number 6) of the DISTRICT, regardless of the manner and method in which any request for such service is conveyed.

ANY DISPUTE, CONTROVERSY OR CLAIM ARISING FROM OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, OR THE BREACH, TERMINATION OR INVALIDITY THEREOF, SHALL BE SETTLED BY ARBITRATION IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FEDERAL ARBITRATION ACT AND THE COMMERCIAL ARBITRATION RULES OF THE AMERICAN ARBITRATION ASSOCIATION (THIS DOES NOT REQUIRE THE USE OF SUCH ASSOCIATION, AND SUCH RULES ARE ONLY PROCEDURES FOR THE ARBITRATION), USING ONE ARBITRATOR - SUCH ARBITRATION TO BE CONDUCTED IN BROWNSVILLE, CAMERON COUNTY, TEXAS IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE - AND A JUDGMENT UPON THE AWARD RENDERED BY THE ARBITRATOR MAY BE ENTERED IN ANY COURT HAVING JURISDICTION THEREOF.

### ORDINANCE NO. 11-20

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, TEXAS, AMENDING SECTION 13-24 (REGULATIONS OF SHADE DEVICES AND CHAIRS ON THE PUBLIC BEACH) OF CHAPTER 13 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PADRE ISLAND BY PROVIDING PROVISIONS FOR PERMITS FOR NON-RENTAL SET-UPS. LESS THAN FIVE UNITS PROVISION, DATE OF RENEWAL AND DELETING WALKWAY SPACING; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES: PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY NOT TO EXCEED FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$500.00) FOR EACH VIOLATION: PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE ORDINANCE: AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION IN CAPTION FORM.

WHEREAS, the City of South Padre Island has heretofore enacted Ordinance 07-06 (May 16,2007) that regulates procedure for the setting up of chairs and umbrellas in anticipation of their use for the beach goers but wants to ensure that the public right to use the beach is not impacted and at the same time recognize that the users of umbrellas and chairs are exercising their right to comfortably use the public beach; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that most of the fee title to the land above mean high tide is subject to private ownership but is burdened by the public beach easement as codified in Chapter 61 of the Natural Resources Code of the State of Texas and the City recognizes that area seaward of the Historical Building Line as public beach area; and

WHEREAS, in order to balance the right of public to use the beach and have available chairs and umbrellas to use, the City has enacted Ordinance 07-06 codified as Sec. 13-24 in the Code of Ordinances of the City and amended by Ordinance 07-6A, Ordinance 10-08 and Ordinance 10-12; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that said Sec. 13-24 should be further amended to provide rules for non-commercial set-ups (not rented) by the littoral property owner and provisions for less than five units:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, TEXAS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The Code of Ordinances of the City of South Padre Island is amended to amend Sec. 13-24 of Chapter 13, to read as follows:

### Sec. 13-24 Regulation of Shade Devices and Chairs on the Public Beach

No person or entity may place shade devices, chairs or other physical devices for rent or use by third parties on any portion of the beach within the City of South Padre Island located seaward of the Historical Building Line without obtaining a permit from the City as provided for by this Section 13-24, and comply with all provisions of this section, to-wit:

- A) (i) Any chairs/umbrellas set up (a "set-up" is two chairs with an umbrella between the chairs) and not occupied or rented may not exceed Ten Percent (10%) of the property frontage on the beach (i.e. 100' frontage = 10 set-ups or 20 chairs with 10 umbrellas). When the total number of chairs with umbrellas (set-ups) exceeds 25% of the property frontage, there may be no more unoccupied chairs with umbrellas (set-ups) set upon the property.
  - (ii) If all allowed set ups as provided above (i) are rented or occupied an additional row or rows may be started if each additional set-up is located upland (behind) the existing set-ups and each additional set-up must be rented or occupied. Must maintain a distance of ten (10') feet between rows, measured from open umbrella to open umbrella.
  - (iii) There must be a four (4') foot wide space (walkway) after ever fifth (5th) set-up, measured from open umbrella to open umbrella.
  - (iii) "Rented" or "occupied" may be evidenced by chair(s) containing personal items and or a paid receipt available containing the date and time of rental with the customer name and method of payment."
- B) All chairs and umbrellas must be marked or tagged to identify the permit holder.
- C) No chairs, umbrellas or other equipment may be set up in public beach access areas or any portion of the platted right-of-way, including cul-de sacs, whether improved or not.
- D) No chairs or umbrellas may be set up in violation of Section 13-23 of the Code of Ordinances.
- E) Damage to dunes is prohibited. All equipment must be removed whenever a hurricane warning is issued for South Padre Island or in the event of extreme high tides. All equipment must be secured to prevent movement by high winds or water.
- F) Neither the permit holder nor their agents or employees may offer or sell any other product or services on the public beach other than the rentals of chairs and umbrellas. Payment for the use of the chairs and umbrellas may be made on the beach area for which the Applicant holds a permit.
- G) All employees or agents of the permit holder must wear an easily readable identification tag or badge with their name and the name of the permit holder.
- H) All permit holders that charge for rentals must hold a valid Texas sales tax number.
- All permit holders must provide proof of liability insurance in the amount of \$100,000.00 per person and \$500,000.00 per event.
- J) Applications for permits under this section must be applied for by the littoral property owner and signed by the Chief Executive Officer (i.e. President or Chairman of the Board of Directors) if the Applicant is an entity or the individual owner(s). Littoral owner(s) may designate an agent or licensee as the Agent to conduct chairs/umbrellas rentals on the beach area of the littoral owner. The permit will be valid only for the beach area appurtenant to the littoral owners property. A separate permit must be obtained for each separate property location.
- K) The City will provide appropriate application forms and once the same is completely filled out, a permit may be issued that will be valid from the date of issuance until February October 1, 2012 following its issuance and all permits will be for one (1) year or less and will expire on February October 1 of each year unless renewed. The initial permit fee shall be as provided by the Fee Schedule for City Services (Sec. 2-75, Code of Ordinances) \$100.00 and renewals by the same Applicant with no change in information shall be \$50.00. The Board of Aldermen may change these fees by Resolution.
- L) Any permit holder violates any of the terms and requirements of this Section may have their permit canceled by the City Manager. Any permit holder may appeal the cancellation within Ten (10) days from Notice of Termination to the City Council. The City Council's decision is final.

M) All permit holders will assist the City by sharing the responsibility of maintaining their permitted area set up with chairs and/or umbrellas clear of litter while in service.

### Not engaged in commercial activity permit

N) Any permit holder (comply with 13-24 J) that is not engaged in commercial activity (does not offer the chairs or umbrellas for rent) and only places shade devices or chairs for use by the littoral property owners, lessees or renters of the beach front property may place shade devices or chairs (set=ups) only if requested to do so by property owners, lessees or renters of said beach front property and must provide supporting documentation of said request including name of individual. The shade devices or chairs ("set-ups") are limited to the number of units located at said beach front property. The provisions of this Sec 13-24 A, G and H do not apply to permits issued per this subsection N.

### Less than five (5) units in the property

- O) Any existing permit holder for other property may place shade devices or chairs only if requested to do so by property owners, lessees or renters of said beach front property with less than five (5) units in the property and must provide supporting documentation of said request including name of individual occupying the beach front property, may do so with out a separate permit for that property. May only provide set-ups for the occupant(s) of that beach front property.
- Section 2. This Ordinance repeals all portions of any prior ordinances or parts of ordinances of the Code of Ordinances in conflict herewith.
- Section 3. Any violation of this Ordinance may be punished by a fine not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each offense or for each day such offense shall continue and the penalty provisions of Section 21-1 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby adopted and incorporated for all purposes.
- Section 4. If for any reason any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this Ordinance for it is the definite intent of this City Council that every section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision hereof be given full force and effect for its purpose.
- This Ordinance shall become effective when published in summary form Section 5. or by publishing its caption.

Discussion and action regarding relocation of overhead power lines relating to the new Fire and Emergency Services Station

### ITEM BACKGROUND

There are overhead lines along Laguna Blvd on the east side adjacent to the new Fire Station site. These overhead lines are on poles that are located within the Laguna Blvd. right-of-way, approximately 1 foot from the property line. As you can see on the site, the contractor is drilling the holes for the piers for the foundation. These piers are approximately 28' deep and 24" and 30" in diameter. The drilling rig must set up near the west property line to drill the holes for the piers for the generator and transformer concrete pad. In addition, the crane on site lowers the 28' long rebar into the hole after it is drilled and also must set up near the west property line. The overhead power lines are too close to the site and AEP does not permit anything within 10' of their power lines. Staff has met on several occasions with AEP design and engineering teams on the site to come up with solutions to this problem. I've specifically asked for a proposal to place those overhead lines underground from Retama to Mezquite but AEP indicated it would take 12 weeks to obtain the necessary materials to go underground and another 3 weeks of construction time, amounting to a significant delay of almost 4 months. Also, the cost would most likely exceed \$100,000.

AEP is proposing to relocate the overhead lines to the west side of Laguna, from ½ block north of Mezquite to ½ block south of Retama. This will require the setting of approximately 10 poles on the west side, but will enable them to remove 6 poles on the east side.

As a side note, there are several palm trees (approximately 6) on the west side of Laguna that would have to be removed.

They have provided us a quote of \$28,750.46 to do this work. We feel this was an oversight on the contractor's part (Peacock General Contractors), but in the long term, the lines need to be removed from the site for the City's benefit as well. There will be roof-top air conditioning units on the roof of the fire station that may need replacing in the future and the generator will require

removal for replacement in the future. These processes will require the use of a crane and if the overhead power lines are not relocated now, will still be in the way. Also, the plans call for a 12' noise attenuation wall around the generator. The height of this wall will need to be reduced to approximately 6.5' if the lines remain as they are.

We have asked Peacock General Contractors to split the \$28,750.46 with the City, upon your approval. The cost to the City would be \$14,375.23.

We also requested the structural engineer examine the feasibility of changing the slab, pouring more piers, shallower piers, etc... but the equipment needed to put in shallower piers would still conflict with the overhead lines.

### **BUDGET/FINANCIAL SUMMARY**

Our cost would be \$14,375.23. The Fire Station Betterment Fund has not been used at all yet. It has a balance of \$196,610.





~Exactly what does this cost include? The Pro Forma says \$28,750.46 for "relocate and install three phase overhead distribution facilities to serve new fire station." The sketches say "1) customer to provide 4" PVC raceway with pull string, gray pipe, schedule 40 2) concrete transformer pad 3) all secondaries and 4) all trenching and backfilling." That section leads me to believe that the line will be placed underground. It is overhead or underground? If it for both temporary relocation of the overhead line and eventual undergrounding of the line, please break down the cost associated with each phase of construction. "Once paid, what is the turn around time for each phase, if phased, to be completed?

We've already included the transformer pad in the design, as we received direction from AEP prior to bidding the project and the plan provided by AEP was included in the plans. If it's included in the cost,

Discussion and action to approve Resolution authorizing the implementation a pilot project to create a sand sculpture trail.

### ITEM BACKGROUND

At the September 7th City Council meeting, the Council approved the concept of creating a Sand Sculpture Trail on the Island and requested that the Development Standards Review Task Force (DSRTF) review the proposal and initiate plans to implement the project. At their meeting, DSRTF members discussed the proposal and identified several issues that needed to be resolved before the project could be fully implemented as a public art project. The issues include the following items:

The need for a clear set of standards or criteria as to what qualifies as public art.

- Public safety standards for the placement of art works on the boulevard.
- Guidelines and procedures for the submission of public art projects for approval.
- Guidelines for maintenance and/or removal of art works.
- All of these standards, guidelines and criteria must be codified in the sign ordinance and in policy documents.

All of this will take time and this means that we would be unable to take advantage of the talents of the master sculptors who will be on the Island for Sandcastle Days this month. Several of these artists along with our local master sculptors have offered to create these semi-permanent sand sculptures while they are here.

There seems to be agreement that we would like to have public art in our community and sand

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sculpture is an art form uniquely suited to our beach resort community. Our current sign ordinance allows for art and public art is required for certain types of development in the Form Based Code. However, we have yet to set up the necessary processes for the approval of public art projects.

We are therefore recommending a two phase process for the establishment of public art guidelines and the implementation of public art projects.

- 1. The DSRTF should proceed with research, discussion and action to establish public art guidelines and the policies necessary for implementation.
- 2. The City Council should approve a resolution authorizing a pilot project to implement a sand sculpture trail subject to the following limitations:
  - The project will be approved for a six (6) month period, after which the sand sculpture trail initiative must meet the criteria for public art as established by the DSRTF.
  - The project will be limited in scope and scale.
  - The size of each sculpture will not exceed 4' high and 4' wide.
  - All sculptures will be erected on City-owned property.
  - Lucinda Wierenga will act as project coordinator
  - Sculptors may carve sponsor name/artist name at base of sculpture in small script
  - No City funds will be used for the construction or maintenance of the sand sculpture trail.

### Proposed locations for sculptures:

- 1. Butterfly Garden (just south of Suntide II) This is a work in progress, already mostly completed.
- 2. City Hall The south concrete planter location, very visible from many angles, high-traffic area. This will be the largest project and could feature more of a monument type sculpture
- 3. Turtle Lady Park Turtle themed
- 4. Water Tower Park Children's park whimsical theme
- 5. Saturn St/Padre Blvd. Corner Landscape sponsor is "Texas Ocean Spot" Ken Dunkem who maintains the planter has given permission for a small sculpture, possibly peeking out from tree
- 6. *Good Hope Circle* this can be larger as the sand supply is ample new walkover for handicapped people makes this a high-traffic area.
- 7. Bougainvillea Circle on the grass, nicely landscaped area

Discussion and action to address the feral cat population on South Padre Island.

### ITEM BACKGROUND

This item was brought to the Board of Alderman on November 16, 2009, tabled and brought back on the December 2, 2009. The agenda item read:

Discussion and action to approve first reading of ordinance 09-22 amending section 3-23 of chapter 3 of the code of ordinances by providing an exception for feral cats that have been neutered or spayed and vaccinated.

Alderman Bagley brought this back from the November 16, 2009 meeting stating that there is three options we have -1) continue being non proactive by doing what we are doing, 2) be proactive by turning feral cats to the Humane Society to be euthanized or 3) be proactive by tag and release.

Dr. Charlotte Romay, President of the Laguna Madre Humane Society outlined the proposed program and answered many questions that were asked. Most of the Board supported the idea, but had concerns for release, especially into the birding areas or areas where feral cats were not wanted.

Alderman Ridolfi made a motion to table this item until December 16, 2009 Regular Council meeting. Motion was seconded by Alderman Evans, which carried unanimously.

### From previous discussions:

Communities need feral cats primarily to keep rodent populations down. By vaccinating them in the process, we broaden the safety margin of a rabies outbreak.

An additional benefit is reducing the number of animals taken to the Isabel Y. Garcia Animal Shelter. Feral cats usually don't make good pets so adopting them is difficult. By releasing the feral cat back into its neighborhood, we save room at the shelter for animals that truly need that safe haven.

Feral cats in this program are only released if they are in good health, uninjured and spayed/neutered. Our current ordinance deems it a violation if the cat is at large.

|-|

Feral cats are not going to be rounded up by colonies and altered in the same fashion as a "Trap, Neuter, Release Program" would. The Humane Society has a grant that would *lower* the cost of altering dogs or cats. It is for the use of altering on pets, not "ferals". Therefore, should a feral cat be trapped and the resident that trapped it **shows interest** in keeping the feral cat, that person may go to the Humane Society and request to have the cat altered under the guidelines of the grant. This would make the said person "the owner" of the feral cat.

The cats that are trapped are covered under the grant if they become "owned". If a feral cat is trapped, and **not wanted** around the resident's house, the cat would be logged in at the Animal Shelter, deemed adoptable or not, and then placed for adoption or euthanized.

The "farm" in Bayview is a private residence with a lot of cats. It is **not** an overflow location for the feral cats. The owner was not available, so we do not have anymore information.

In a nut shell, the feral cats are altered under this guideline:

- The person that trapped the cats takes ownership of the cat.
- That person attains a voucher from the Humane Society to have the cat altered by Dr. Monroe.
- It may cost that person money to have the cat altered and vaccinated.
- That person will be responsible for the cat's well-being and any other maintenance with vaccinations.

### RECOMMENDATIONS/COMMENTS

Concerns regarding this amendment:

- The Humane Society does not have vacancy for feral cats to wait for altering or vaccinations. At this time, animals are vaccinated, altered and examined on an appointment basis after an adoption contract has been signed and the adoption fees paid. There is only one veterinarian at the Port Isabel Animal Clinic, at this time.
- How would we, as Animal Control Officers, Animal Shelter Employees, citizens, or Animal Clinic Staff, be able to distinguish if a cat is feral or a family pet that was taken from its owners? How are we going to match the feral cats to their owners?
- Port Isabel is not practicing the feral cat program. They are in the process of **establishing** the program. (Program since established-City of Port Isabel Ordinance 483-E attached)
- The Laguna Madre Humane Society is in support of this, but it is not one of their programs.
- The grant can be applied for again by the Humane Society. It is available every two years.
- Corpus Christi is not practicing the "TNR" program. Their ordinance allows owners to let their cats roam freely as long as they are registered with the city and have a tag displayed on the cat's collar.

^{*}Feral cats are **not altered** if there is **no person** to take **ownership** of that cat.

Possibly amend Chapter 3-23 of the Code of Ordinances allowing for the release of feral cats which are ear marked, providing proof they have been medically cleared, vaccinated and spayed/neutered.

### Feral Cat Proposal from the Friends of Animal Rescue

We believe that a healthy and altered feral cat population is valuable to the Island residents and businesses. Feral cats have been proven to keep the rodent population under control. Approximately 100 feral cats are trapped and taken to the Port Isabel Shelter each year from the Island. In the past the cats were kept at the shelter. The new interlocal agreement with Port Isabel states that feral cats from the Island will be euthanized if not rescued by one of the animal rescue groups.

#### **Our Action Plan:**

The Friends currently have commitments for up to 10 feral cat colonies on the Island from businesses and residents.

The Friends would trap the cats with the help of SPI Animal Control.

The cats would then be vetted; tested for contagious diseases, vaccinated, and spay/neutered. The cats would have the right ear clipped so Code knows the animal has been altered.

Cats would be returned to the area where they were trapped.

Cats that cannot be returned to the area would be taken to volunteer farms in the area.

### Benefits to the Island:

Organizations realize positive benefits after implementing Trap-Neuter-Return, including:

- Improving the cats' lives;
- Stabilizing colonies—reproduction stops and litters are not born;
- An immediate reduction in calls from neighbors about behaviors associated with mating, including spraying, caterwauling, fighting, roaming, and breeding;
- Resources previously spent on ineffective removal and/or lethal services are spent on non-lethal, life-saving, positive, publicly-supported initiatives such as subsidized neuter services, adoption, and outreach programs;
- Positive public reaction, fundraising platforms and partnership opportunities, media exposure, and support from staff, volunteers, other like-minded organizations, and the community at large.
- Control of rodent population.

### **Cost to City**

The vetting of the ferals will be provided through private donations and The Friends of Animal Rescue

We will be applying for a Petsmart grant.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, TEXAS, AMENDING SEC 3-23 OF CHAPTER 3 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF SOUTH PADRE ISLAND (ANIMALS AND FOWL) BY PROVIDING AN EXCEPTION FOR FERAL CATS THAT HAVE BEEN NEUTERED OR SPAYED AND VACCINATED; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES: PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING A PENALTY NOT TO EXCEED FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$500.00) FOR EACH OFFENSE: PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE ORDINANCE; AND AUTHORIZING PUBLICATION IN CAPTION FORM.

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen has determined that feral cats in the Town of South Padre Island that have been neutered/spayed and vaccinated should be permitted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sec. 23 of Chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of South Padre Island is hereby amended to read as follows, to-wit:

### "Sec.3-23 Cats at large.

All cats located within the Town shall at all times be fenced, housed, leashed, tethered or in some other manner physically restrained so that they may not at any time run at large within the limits of the Town. Any cat found at large within the Town may be impounded by any police officer or by a duly designated Health Officer and processed as provided in Article II regarding dogs, with exception to feral cats that have been neutered/spayed and vaccinated and the cat(s) is identified with a cropped right ear. When trapped these cats shall be released at the point of origin unless they are sick or injured.

Section 2. Any violation of this Ordinance may be punished by a fine not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each offense or for each day such offense shall continue and the penalty provisions of Section 21-1 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby adopted and incorporated for all purposes.

Section 3. If for any reason, any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this Ordinance, for it is the definite intent of this Board of Aldermen that every section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision hereof be given full force and effect for its purpose.

## CITY OF SOUTH PADRE ISLAND TRAVEL, TRAINING AND CLIENT ENTERTAINMENT POLICY

The City of South Padre Island will pay reasonable expenses, which are incurred in the course of authorized City travel. The City has two objectives when paying travel-related expenses:

- 1. To provide employees sufficient funds to execute business on behalf of the City.
- 2. To safeguard City funds by paying only reasonable and necessary expenses.

This policy outlines what constitutes a reasonable and necessary expense.

Directors are ultimately responsible for insuring that travel expenditures comply with this policy and for the thorough review and approval of all documents necessary for the travel transaction. For purposes of this policy, the term "Director" refers to the Department Director or their designee.

Directors have the discretion to implement more restrictive procedures and/or guidelines for their individual departments. The purpose of the required documentation is to provide sufficient evidence to anyone, who reviews the travel transaction, that public funds were expended in compliance with this policy.

Employees traveling on behalf of the City of South Padre Island are expected to utilize services and accommodations appropriate for the business to be conducted. Employees are expected to travel and conduct business in reasonable comfort and exercise good judgment in distinguishing between comfort and extravagance.

All required travel forms can be found on the City's shared drive under the Employee Travel Information folder.

### I. APPROVAL REQUIRED FOR TRAVEL ON CITY BUSINESS.

The City will pay travel and registration fee expenses required for City business or to enhance the knowledge of the individual for the benefit of the City.

- **A. Travel Authorization Form** Employees must obtain prior approval for travel from their Director by completing an electronic Travel Authorization Form. During an extended absence, the Director must notify the Finance Department and appoint a temporary designee for travel authorization. In the event travel is conducted without prior approval, the employee will be held responsible for all expenses incurred.
- **B. Travel Advance Request Form (Cash Advances)** An advance for estimated travel expenses may be requested. The Travel Advance Request Form must be signed by both the requesting employee and the Director. The form must include the purpose of the trip, the destination (city and state), and the departure/return dates and times. Travel Advance Request Forms should be submitted to the Finance Department at least 10 calendar days prior to departure.

Following a trip, employees must account for their travel advance by completing and submitting a properly approved Employee Expense Report to the Finance Department within fifteen (15) working days of their return date. Failure to comply with this policy will result in: (1) disciplinary action for the first offense; and (2) disciplinary action and denial of future travel advances for a second offense. Unused travel advance money must be returned to the City and supporting documentation (receipts) attached to the Employee's Expense Report. Authorized expenses in excess of advance funds received will be reimbursed with proper approval.

- C. Employee Expense Report Form An Employee Expense Report must be completed for all travel when the city-issued credit card is NOT used. The form must include the purpose of the trip, the destination (city and state), and the departure/return dates and times. All receipts and supporting documents must be attached to the Employee Expense Report. Receipts should be affixed in date order to an 8 ½ x 11 sheet of paper and attached to the Employee Expense Report, and then forwarded to the Finance Department after being reviewed and signed by the Director. Each employee traveling will be responsible for submitting his/her own receipts and Employee Expense Report. All Employee Expense Reports must be submitted within the timeframe as referenced in Section IB. Expense reports MUST include the lint item in which expenses are to be charged.
- **D.** City-Issued Credit Card When a city-issued credit card is used to pay for expenses, the monthly electronic expense report must be completed and filed with the Finance Department.

- **E. Out-of-State Travel** All out-of-state travel must be pre-approved by the City Manager or by the Executive Director of the CVB for CVB employees. The per diem rate for out-of-state travel will be in accordance with the U.S. General Services Administration's published per diem rates for the specified destination.
- **F.** Travel on Behalf of Other Agencies With the approval of the Department Director, employees may be granted travel time on behalf of other organizations. In unusual circumstances, the City Manager is authorized to approve an advance of City funds for travel expenses incurred on such trips. The same guidelines outlined in this policy must be followed.
- **G.** Travel Outside Normal Workday The City of South Padre Island will pay for travel outside of normal working hours for business purposes when pre-approved by the Department Director.
- **H. Other Authorizations/Approvals** Authorization for Travel and Expense Report approval for Directors and the Assistant City Manager will be the next level of supervision as appropriate.
- **I. Compliance** Abuse of this policy, including falsifying expense reports or submitting false claims, will result in disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment.

### II. REIMBURSABLE EXPENSES – General Information

The City shall pay actual necessary transportation and living expenses for an employee or City official traveling on City business. It is the City's policy to pay for, or reimburse, all **reasonable and necessary** expenses incurred by an employee when the employee travels on City-related business in accordance with this policy.

- **A. Expenses Not Covered in Policy** The City Manager's approval must be obtained prior to any expenditure of funds for items or charges which are not specifically addressed in the travel policy.
- **B. Credit Card for Travel Expenses** Some employees may be issued City credit cards and these cards can be used for travel and other travel-related expenses that are typically paid by the City. Personal expenses are not to be placed on a City credit card. Misuse of the City's credit card or violation of this policy may result in card privileges being revoked or other disciplinary action being taken, as deemed appropriate.

### III. MEALS

Expenses for meals shall either be reimbursed at actual cost as supported by receipts or by per diem allowance. If an employee is requesting to be reimbursed for actual costs, a detailed receipt (a credit card receipt listing the total amount due is not considered a detailed receipt) must accompany the request for reimbursement. In lieu of itemized receipts for meals, a per diem allowance of \$50 per day is authorized based on \$10 for breakfast, \$15 for lunch, and \$25 for dinner.

Even if supported by a receipt, reimbursement shall not exceed \$10 for breakfast, \$15 for lunch, and \$25 for dinner. If your seminar or training event includes the provision for a meal, the appropriate deduction will be made from your per diem or allowable reimbursement.

Meals eligible for reimbursement include:

- If you depart City of South Padre Island before 7:00 a.m. and return after 9:00 a.m., breakfast is allowed.
- If you depart City of South Padre Island before 11:00 a.m. and return after 1:00 p.m., lunch is allowed.
- If you depart City of South Padre Island before 5:00 p.m. and return after 7:00 p.m., dinner is allowed.

The City of South Padre Island will reimburse in accordance with this policy for meals that are associated with business travel.

The per diem shall be adjusted for partial travel days. Travel-related meals will be reimbursed if an overnight stay is required or if multiple trips are required during two or more consecutive days.

The City will not pay for meals for individuals who are not employed by the City of South Padre Island except with the written approval of the Director stating the business purpose of the meal. If an exception is granted, an itemized meal receipt with attendee names must be attached to the Employee Expense Report.

The City will pay for meals at scheduled seminars, training sessions, and other meetings, but will not reimburse for meals elsewhere if the meal cost was included in the conference fee. If meals are included in the conference fee, the per diem rate will be prorated based on allowable meal allowance. The City will not pay for social or recreational conference functions that are separate ticketed events not included in the base conference registration fee without prior approval of the Director (to be noted on the Travel Authorization form).

Meal related tips are not included in the per diem rate total. The City will not pay for gratuity in excess of 20%.

### IV. TRANSPORTATION

The most efficient and economical mode of travel must be used. Air travel arrangements are to be made by each department. Air travel must be booked at the most discounted fare basis whenever possible. When authorized, an employee using a personal vehicle on City business shall be paid an amount per mile, equivalent to the current rate paid by the State to its employees, or shall be paid the equivalent of a coach airline fare, whichever results in the lower cost to the City. Travel distances may be determined by the actual odometer reading or may be determined using online mapping services (e.g. mapquest, google maps, etc.).

In instances of approved private vehicle use, reimbursement will also be made for mileage tolls and parking fees. When possible, receipts should be provided for toll and parking fees, as well as for taxi cabs, limos, and other modes of transportation. The City will pay for rental vehicles upon written approval of the City Manager or the Executive Director of the CVB for CVB employees.

Under special circumstances, the Director may authorize the use of a personal vehicle even when it is more costly to the City to allow for the transportation of business-related material or additional personnel.

- **A. First-Class Accommodations** Employees may choose to travel first-class, but the City will only pay coach class fares.
- **B. Commercial Airlines** The City of South Padre Island will pay for coach roundtrip airfare. Employees are expected to take advantage of discounts whenever possible. However, employees are not required to fly at unusual times just to qualify for discounts. Employees may retain frequent flyer miles and similar travel awards; however, he/she shall not pay a higher price for the fare in order to obtain frequent flyer miles.
- **C. Private Air Carriers and Charters** Employees shall not use private airplanes or charters without approval of the City Manager. Cost savings or emergency schedule requirements must be shown and included with the City Manager's written approval.
- **D. Vehicle Rental** The City will not assure payment for rental cars without the prior written approval of the employee's Director. When renting vehicles, the employee's personal auto insurance is the primary source of coverage in the event of an accident.

Appendix A is provided to help calculate the least expensive travel method, demonstrated need for the vehicle and justification why other transportation options were not utilized. The appropriate size of the rental vehicle should depend on such factors as the number of passengers, and the amount of luggage and/or equipment being carried.

- **E. Taxi** The City will pay/reimburse employee's taxi fares for required transportation. When possible, a receipt must be attached to the Employee Expense Report.
- **F. Personal Vehicles** With the approval of the Department Director, employees may use their personal vehicle for out-of-town travel. A mileage log or other supporting documentation must be attached to the Employee Expense Report. The City of South Padre Island will pay the State of Texas mileage reimbursement rate in effect at the time of travel. When an employee has approval to use his or her personal car on a trip and the destination is more than 300 miles from the point of departure (one-way), the City will not reimburse the employee for expenses, such as lodging, meals and incidentals, while in transit, which exceed the cost of a 21-day advance round-trip coach airfare.
  - 1. Those employees receiving a car allowance will not be paid mileage reimbursement for travel, which is within Cameron County.
  - Personal car travel reimbursement is limited to the lesser of either the cost of making the trip by 21-day advance coach airfare or mileage reimbursement. Appendix B is provided to help calculate the least expensive travel method, which is the amount that will be reimbursed.
  - 3. The City will pay/reimburse for any additional work related mileage at the destination. A mileage log or other supporting documentation must be attached to the Employee Expense Report.
  - 4. The City will pay/reimburse for parking expenses, including airport parking (at the general or remote parking rate). For airport parking, supporting documentation must be attached to the Employee Expense Report and can be obtained from the airport's website. Mileage reimbursement to the airport will be calculated from the employee's office (workday destination) or from the employee's home to the airport, whichever is less.
  - 5. If an employee is driving a personal vehicle outside of the City and has car failure, the City will pay the expense of towing the vehicle to the nearest garage, over and above the employee's personal towing insurance coverage. The employee must pay for all repairs. The towing invoice and insurance documentation, reflecting amount covered, must be attached to the Employee Expense Report.

6. City vehicles should be used when available or at the discretion of the Director. Direct expenses associated with the use of a City vehicle, which are incurred by the employee, such as gasoline and oil, will be reimbursed.

### V. ACCOMMODATIONS

The City will pay actual expenses for hotels, motels, or other lodging. Employees must request the reduced government rate or conference rate when making reservations. Most hotels will not accept claims to a government rate after check-in. City employees are not exempt from hotel taxes, and will be reimbursed for such taxes. The City will pay no more than the cost of a single occupancy room. If an employee shares a room with someone who is not an employee of the City or who is not traveling on City business, and the room cost is higher than the single room rate, the bill must be adjusted for the difference in cost. An itemized hotel receipt must be provided including an itemization for any room service charges to be paid/reimbursed by the City. Meals ordered through room service or consumed in the hotel restaurant will be covered through the per diem rate and the bill must be adjusted for the difference in cost.

### VI. TELEPHONE

Reasonable and necessary long distance business telephone calls and computer related expenses for City business will be reimbursed. City owned cell phones may be available for use when an employee travels on City business. Employees who wish to use a City cell phone when traveling should contact their Department Director.

### VII. INCIDENTAL & NON-ALLOWABLE EXPENSES

Incidental expenses are covered as part of the per diem rate for meals. Incidental expenses include such items as fees and tips given to porters, baggage carriers, bellhops, hotel maids, and other miscellaneous service-related expenses as it pertains to conducting City business.

Expenses or charges for the following will normally not be reimbursed and must be paid for by the employee:

- In-hotel pay television and movies
- Magazines and books
- Tickets to the theater or sporting events
- Dry cleaning and laundry (If an employee is traveling on city-related business for more than five days, the Director may authorize the reimbursement of necessary dry cleaning and laundry service expenses)
- Health club and spas

- Expenses of a spouse or guest
- Personal long distance telephone calls
- Other items of a personal nature
- Entertainment The City of South Padre Island will not reimburse employees for entertainment unless it is necessary for the purpose of the trip. See Section VII Client Entertainment for additional clarification and guidance.
- Alcoholic Beverages Under no circumstances will the cost of alcoholic beverages be reimbursed nor should they be charged on a City issued credit card. Employees are expected to pay for any alcoholic beverages separate from any eligible meal. See Section VII Client Entertainment for additional clarification and guidance.

### VIII. CLIENT ENTERTAINMENT

Employees shall ensure that limited funds available for the purpose of client entertainment are spent prudently. Client entertainment is a necessary marketing strategy to attract and retain customer bookings for conventions and special events. The purpose of this policy is to establish a client entertainment practice and related procedures that will ensure management and financial controls and allow proper, complete and timely payment and reimbursement for approved client entertainment related expenses. For the purpose of this policy, a client is considered an individual or groups identified as having the ability to book, or influence the booking of, new or repeat events at the Convention Centre, other venues within the city limits of South Padre Island or have a positive impact the South Padre Island economy.

If a City employee expects the client entertainment expense to exceed \$250 in total, the City employee shall complete a Request for Client Entertainment Authorization and obtain approval of such request before incurring such expenses. Regardless of the funding source, a Request for Client Entertainment Authorization must be approved by either the City Manager or the Executive Director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB). Approval of client entertainment expenses must be deemed important to the effective solicitation or retention of bookings and that such booking is of sufficient importance and magnitude to warrant the anticipated expenditure. Upon conclusion of the client entertainment, the City employee shall submit a Client Entertainment Expense Report for approval.

Client entertainment funds from any source shall be expended in accordance with the following:

Alcohol may be purchased <u>only at the client's request</u> and in reasonable quantities. The City will not pay or reimburse for expensive alcohol products (such as rare brandies, wines, etc. that cost in excess of \$50). City employees shall make all reasonable efforts to ensure that persons in attendance do not drink to excess. The purchase of alcohol is

limited to no more than two drinks per person. Additionally, no alcohol will be purchased by the City for individuals to take with them to their lodging room.

City employees engaged in client entertainment activities are representatives of the City. In any interaction with clients, City employees shall ensure that their behavior continuously reflects positively on the City and they shall seek to avoid the appearance of impropriety at all times.

All choices for client entertainment shall be tailored to the expectations of the client, with due regard to the value of the business as well as the type and level of client entertainment offered by our competitors. Those decisions shall also have due regard for our goal of minimizing expenses as to maximize the impact of our sales and marketing dollars.

City employees shall make every reasonable effort to direct such client entertainment in support of business entities that are located within the City of South Padre Island. Location selection should also be considered a place where costs can be minimized and we can ensure the maintenance of a suitable environment in which to conduct business.

In the event that client entertainment is held outside of the City, the City employee must consider a location in which the food is reasonably priced while also taking into consideration the expectations of the client, the value of the business and the type and value of the entertainment offered by competitors. In addition, the City employee shall attempt to arrange for a breakfast or lunch meeting to minimize the cost.

Client entertainment expenses shall not exceed the normal cost range of such goods, services and fees for the locale in which they are provided or performed.

Expenses will not be reimbursed if the City employee is incurring entertainment expenses in the Employee's private residence, unless approved in advance by the City Manager or Executive Director of the CVB.

Client entertainment expenses shall not be reimbursed from any source for the cost of solely entertaining other City employees. In addition, no costs associated with the entertainment of City employee's spouses, family members or other non-client persons or for spouses or companions of clients, unless specifically indicated by the nature of the event and pre-approved by the City Manager or Executive Director of the CVB.

In addition, no funding shall be used for the following:

- 1. Gifts or other expenses associated with employee or associate retirements, birthdays or other celebratory events;
- 2. Goods and services which are illegal or illicit;

- 3. Goods and services which may reasonably be deemed to be extravagant or those that materially exceed the normal cost range for the locale in which they are provided or performed;
- 4. Goods and services associated with a lack of moral turpitude;
- 5. Disbursements to clients of any cash, check, or any other form of credit;
- 6. Loans to clients of any cash, check or any other form of credit; or,
- 7. Merchandise for use or possession by City employees

Client entertainment may be expensed through the travel and training accounts within a specific City Department's budget. The City Manager and the Executive Director of the CVB shall establish a list of employees who are eligible to perform client entertainment activities based on their job duties. The list of such persons shall be submitted to the City Council for approval as well as approval of any additions thereto.

The following positions are authorized to engage in client entertainment on behalf of the City of South Padre Island:

- Executive Director of the CVB (Dan Quandt)
- Deputy Director of the CVB (Connie Ledbetter)
- National Tourism Coordinator (DeeOnda Ahadi)
- Sales Manager (Sylvia Soliz)
- International Tourism Coordinator (Lili DeRousie)
- Special Events Coordinator (Mary K. Hancock)

### IX. TRAVEL WRITER POLICY

The City of South Padre Island welcomes travel media and often provides assistance to writers regarding itineraries and expenses to create a positive experience.

All travel writers must receive pre-authorization from the Executive Director of the CVB and the following guidelines are applicable to travel writers in order to receive financial assistance from the City.

### Travel writers must provide:

- · A brief bio and samples of published stories.
- Letter of assignment (if working for a specific publication).
- Name of publications to which the writer plans to submit articles and their circulation. (Please note that targeted publications must have a minimum circulation of 25,000 unless otherwise approved.)
- · Two editorial references (name, publications, phone numbers).
- Writers must give the CVB at least two business weeks' notice before their arrival (unless special circumstances arise - to be approved by the CVB). Every effort will

be made to accommodate the writer's date preferences; however, it is not guaranteed.

- All transportation cost to get here will be the responsibility of the writer. Some transportation may be provided by CVB staff if needed, but prior arrangement will be required.
- Contact information including mailing address, phone number and email address.
- Types of activities regarding special interest/focus of story/special requests.
- Arrival date, length of visit, departure date.

### NOTES:

- The City recommends that working media professionals consider travel Sunday through Thursday as weekends typically have the highest occupancy demand for area accommodations.
- The CVB strives to make the most of each writer's time on the Island. We
  develop full itineraries that allow working media to experience as much as
  they can each day they are here.
- The City will not pay for expenses incurred by anyone traveling with the writer.
- Tear sheets on any subsequent stories on South Padre Island are to be provided to the CVB in a timely manner upon publication.

### The CVB will provide:

- Press Access: The CVB will work with the writer to develop a customized itinerary
  of attractions, cultural venues and other points of interest based on the interests
  and story angles of the writer. The CVB will arrange for the writer's admission to
  the attractions, activities and events included in the itinerary, and will provide
  assistance with meals included on the itinerary. A guide from the CVB will
  accompany journalists during their visit.
- <u>Lodging</u>: The CVB will provide complimentary rooms for up to two nights for
  writers who have received preauthorization from the Executive Director. If the
  writer has not been preauthorized, then it is up to the individual property to decide
  if services will be complimentary or provided at a reduced rate. Accommodations
  are subject to availability.
- Ground Transportation: Writers are responsible for their own transportation while
  in South Padre Island. Rental cars are the responsibility of the writer, but the CVB
  can supply a list of local rental companies. However, in most cases, a CVB staff
  member will accompany the writer and can provide transportation to locations and
  amenities identified on the official itinerary.
- Photos: The CVB maintains a photo library on its website should the writer need pictures to accompany a story.

### ITEM

Discussion and action to amend the Town of South Padre Island Employee Handbook policy section 32.0 Sick Leave by placing a cap on the sick leave reserve that was grandfathered to City Employees in October of 1997 at the employee's base hourly rate as of 10/01/2011. This policy will cap the payout amount at the current base rate to insure the amount of unfunded liability does not increase but decrease in the future.

### ITEM BACKGROUND

During the City Council Meeting held on September 21st, 2011 the City Council approved an amendment to the Employee Handbook changing the language to allow the City to take from the sick leave first earn instead of last earned. This was the first step to decreasing the City's unfunded liability related to this topic.

As discussed, staff is now bringing forward an additional amendment to the sick leave policy capping the payout of this amount at the employee's base hourly rate as of 10/01/2011. These two steps combined will decrease the unfunded liability overtime and immediately protect it from increasing.

### Policy:

In October of 1997 the handbook was changed to state: "all future, earned and unused Medical Leave Credit will be paid at the rate of fifty percent (50%) of the earned leave rate upon resignation of employment with proper notice and good standing. All previous earned and unused medical leave credit accumulated prior to October 1st, 1997 will be paid at the rate of one hundred percent (100%) of the earned leave rate upon resignation of employment with proper notice and good standing. NOTE: Sick leave taken is charged to sick leave last earned."

### **BUDGET/FINANCIAL SUMMARY**

There are currently 22 employees that this will affect. The number of hours each employee holds times their hourly rate is calculated below. Total liability = \$137,517.15.

### COMPREHENSIVE PLAN GOAL

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### RECOMMENDATIONS/COMMENTS

Staff recommends that the City Council approve these amendments to the Employee Handbook. This will authorize the City to cap the current reserve bank at the base hourly rate the employee is earning as of 10/01/2011. This will reduce the future unfunded financial liability regarding sick leave reserve amounts.

### 32.0 Sick Leave

For each month of completed service, all full-time regular employees, accrue sick leave benefits at the rate of one (1) day (8 hours), except Fire Fighters who accrue 12 hours. Sick leave may not be taken in excess of days earned and accrued.

Employees may use accrued sick leave during the orientation period. Part-time and Temporary/Seasonal employees do not earn sick leave benefits. Employees do not accrue sick leave during a leave without pay, including workers compensation leave and family medical leave.

Sick leave may be granted for an illness or injury of an immediate family member which requires the personal care and attention of the employee. (See Section 35)

Sick leave may be used when an employee is absent from work due to:

- Physical injury or illness to the employee, on or off duty; when supplemental pay is not being received by the employee due to the work injury.
- The need to care for the employee's immediate family members. "Immediate family" includes employee's spouse, children, parents, grandparents, brothers, sisters and parents of the employee's spouse.
- Medical or dental appointments for the employee, spouse or dependent child, provided that the employee must make a reasonable effort to schedule such appointments at times which have the least interference with the work day;
- Exposure to a contagious disease where on the job presence of the employee would jeopardize the health of others;
- Use of a prescription drug which impairs job performance or safety;
- Actual periods of a temporary disability. Employees may request additional time
  off beyond the actual period of disability; vacation leave, compensatory time, or
  leave without pay may be used.
- "Effective October 1, 1997 all future, earned and unused Medical Leave Credit will be paid at the rate of fifty percent (50%) of the earned leave rate upon resignation of employment with proper notice and good standing. All previous earned and unused Medical Leave Credit accumulated prior to October 1, 1997 will be paid at the rate of one hundred percent (100%) of the earned leave rate upon resignation of employment with proper notice and good standing." (Amended by Ordinance No. 97-15)
- Effective October 1st, 2011 all sick leave remaining in the sick leave reserve bank that was accumulated prior to October 1st of 1997 will be paid out at the

employee's base hourly rate as of October 1st, 2011 upon resignation of employment with proper notice and good standing, regardless of the employee's pay rate when the amount is paid.

- Note: Sick leave taken is charged to sick leave first earned.
- An employee who is absent may be required to provide a statement from a licensed health care provider regarding the illness as well as the estimated time the employee may be off duty, at the request of the Department Director or City Manager. Failure to do so, at the discretion of the Department Director and concurred by the City Manager, may result in immediate termination of employment and forfeiture of such sick leave.
- Employees who are habitually absent due to illness or disability may be terminated if their disability cannot be reasonably accommodated and/or when the employee's absenteeism prevents the orderly and effective provision of services to the citizens of the Town.
- Employees who use all their accumulated sick leave and require more time off
  work due to illness or injury may, with their Department Director's and the City
  Manager's prior approval, take leave without pay.
- Employees placed on lay-off status may receive pay for all accrued sick leave at the time of the lay-off.
- Employees may accrue and carry over from one year to the next a maximum of ninety (90) days of accrued sick leave. The maximum carry over will be determined as of September 30th of each year and any days in excess of ninety (90) will be removed. There are no exceptions. This amount will be removed from sick leave last earned.
