


Staphylococcus aureus

Staphylococcus aureus (staph) is a type of bacteria that's commonly found on the skin, throats and nostrils of many healthy people and animals. Therefore, it usually doesn't cause illness unless it is transmitted to food products where it can multiply and produce harmful toxins. Staphylococcal food poisoning can cause many of the same symptoms as other foodborne illnesses, such as nausea, stomach cramps, vomiting or diarrhea. The bacteria can also be found in unpasteurized dairy products, salty foods such as ham and other sliced meats, or in foods that require no cooking, such as puddings, prepared salads or sandwiches. Staphylococcal toxins are heat resistant, which means they cannot be destroyed by cooking.

Sources: Foods that are made or come in contact with the hands and require no additional cooking are at highest risk, including: Salads, such as ham, egg, tuna, chicken, potato and macaroni
Bakery products, such as cream-filled pastries, cream pies and chocolate éclairs
Sandwiches

Prevention: Wash hands with soap and water, do not prepare or serve food if you have a nose or eye infection or if you have wounds or skin infections on your hands or wrists. Keep the kitchen area clean and keep food out of the danger zone by cooling foods immediately in wide, shallow containers and refrigerating them.

Animal safety facts: Injuries caused by animals are the second most frequent cause of emergency room visits each year.

- There are 5+ million incidents involving animals annually.
- 70% of dog bites are to children under 10 years of age, and 77% of the bites are to the facial area.
- 77% of dog bites are from dogs owned by family and friends and take place in a familiar area.
- 65% of serial attacks and 79% of rampage attacks (biting multiple people during one occurrence) are committed by Pit Bull breeds and Rottweilers.

Tips to Prevent Mosquito Bites

Using the right insect repellent and other preventive actions can discourage mosquitoes, ticks and other biting insects from landing on you. Here are tips for other preventive actions you can take against mosquitoes.

Remove Mosquito Habitats

- Eliminate standing water in rain gutters, old tires, buckets, plastic covers, toys, or any other container where mosquitoes can breed.
- Empty and change the water in bird baths, fountains, wading pools, rain barrels, and potted plant trays at least once a week to destroy potential mosquito habitats.
- Drain or fill temporary pools of water with dirt.
- Keep swimming pool water treated and circulating.

Use Structural Barriers

- Cover all gaps in walls, doors, and windows to prevent mosquitoes from entering.
- Make sure window and door screens are in good working order.
- Completely cover baby carriers and beds with netting.

Avoid Getting Bitten

- Keep mosquitoes away from exposed skin by wearing long-sleeved shirts, long pants, and socks.
- Tuck shirts into pants and pants into socks to cover gaps in your clothing where mosquitoes can get to your skin.
- Stay indoors at sunrise, sunset, and early in the evening when mosquitoes are most active.
